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

What is Social Media?

- Social media refers to online platforms that allow users to create and share content, connect with friends and family, and participate in online communities.
- Popular platforms include Instagram (photo and video sharing), TikTok (short-form video), YouTube (video sharing), and many more.

Social Media - The Positives

- Connect and share: Social media allows children to stay connected with friends and family, especially those who live far away.
- Creativity and expression: Platforms offer opportunities to share creative content like photos, videos, or music.
- Learning and exploration: Children can discover new interests, learn new skills, and access a wealth of educational content.





Challenges to Consider

- Cyberbullying: Online harassment can be hurtful and have a lasting impact on a child's emotional well-being.
- Privacy Concerns: Oversharing personal information online can be risky.
- **Unrealistic Expectations:** Social media often portrays a curated, unrealistic version of reality, leading to feelings of inadequacy.
- **Screen Time:** Excessive screen time can displace other important activities and impact sleep.

Strategies for Keeping Kids Safe Online

- Open Communication: Talk openly with your child about their online experiences. Encourage them to come to you with any concerns.
- **Digital Citizenship**: Teach them about responsible online behavior, like kindness and respect towards others.
- Privacy Settings: Review privacy settings on social media platforms together and ensure they understand what information is being shared.
- Parental Controls: Screen time, Access to content

FCPS Policy

• Students in FCPS are to utilize technology using <u>only</u> programs and websites designated by their teachers.

 Students are expected to use the technology ethically, respecting the privacy and work of others, and leave items in good condition for he next use, and follow established rules for safety and security.

• Students are advised that the inappropriate use of FCPS technology resources is a violation of student disciplinary rules, regardless of where or when the inappropriate use occurs. As such, schools will respond to instances of inappropriate use by following normal disciplinary procedures, just as they would if the incident occurred in the physical classroom



FCPS Policy

Students with phones and watches that have both internet and phone access should remain
in students' backpacks throughout the entire instructional day.

• Students may not access social media sites during school hours except where allowed by school administration. If allowed, social media activity must be limited to academic activities.

 Misuse of social media outside of school hours falls on the responsibility of the parent/guardian. School discipline will not be an end result of improper use of Social Media that occurs outside of school. If incidents impact student relationships/safety in the school building, administration will get involved to support the educational environment and student well-being.

Building Positive Online Habits



- Co-viewing: Watch social media content with your child and discuss what you see together.
- **Promote Positive Content**: Encourage your child to follow inspiring accounts and create positive content themself.
- Family Media Agreement: Develop a family agreement outlining expectations for screen time, online behavior, and content restrictions.
- **Parental Controls**: Utilize parental control features available on devices and platforms to create a safer online environment.


